Digital Maker Badge

1st Martlesham Scouts completed their Digital Maker Stage 3 badges hosted by BT and UoS at Adastral Park, Ipswich. The Scouts completed the European Astro Pi

Challenge, which offers young people the fantastic opportunity to conduct scientific investigations in space by writing computer programs on Raspberry Pi computers on board the International Space Station (ISS).



They also received BT's Network Operations Centre (NOC) and Digitech (UoS) tours. The Scouts learned about BT's essential role in keeping the critical national infrastructure running and how UoS teaches and develops skills for the future.

POR Changes

Integrating POR: The appointment process in Chapter 16. There are no specific rule changes, but it draws together all rules relating to Adult Roles from across Chapters 3, 4, 5, 15 & POR: The appointment process.

The replacement of POR: The appointment process - Table 2 and Table 3 with the Roles Table. The opportunity has been taken to improve the formatting and usability of the table.

The safeguarding and vetting decision guidance has been reviewed and brought up to date.

Amendments to various rules to reflect that the UK Headquarters membership fee is payable 'for' each member rather than 'by' members.

Air Rifle First for Suffolk Scouts

James is a Cub Scout Leader in Orwell District and has recently qualified as a Youth Proficiency Scheme Tutor under the national Smallbore Rifle Association (NSRA,) which now allows him to run air rifle shooting activities. This is an amazing achievement for him as he is the first person with a sight impairment to hold this qualification in the U.K..

James has been a leader in scouting for 16 years and really enjoys this and doesn't let his disability prevent him from running a very successful Cub Pack. Over the last 16 years James has had a varied experience of leaders and trainers, with some not always understanding the need for reasonable adjustments and looking for reasons why he can't do something without even having a conversation to find a potential solution.

James was really impressed with how inclusive the NSRA and, particularly the course instructor, had been towards him both prior to and during the course. It was also refreshing for James to hear how Shooting is very much a "sport for anyone" regardless of ability, disability, or anything else that someone may consider a disadvantage.

After the course James emailed the instructor, Paul, to say "You have made such a positive impact on me over the weekend and I'm really pleased I was able to demonstrate I could live up to your high standard of safety expectation and gain your confidence that I can safely run taster sessions for our young people next term. I am privileged to have the added advantage of being able to show young people with additional needs/disabilities that if I can qualify as an instructor there is absolutely no reason why they can't be fully included in a shooting activity themselves and achieve their full potential!"

It was through open and honest conversations with the NSRA when signing up for the course that James was able to agree the small changes that were needed, such as sending the course presentation in advance so that his screen-reading software could read it to him. Nothing about the actual course could be changed as it is a legal qualification. We often make reasonable adjustments to enable young people in scouting to be fully included in our activities, but sometimes we forget about our adult volunteers. Well done James – you should be very proud of your achievement.

World Scout Jamboree

Early April we held our first camp for the Suffolk World Scout Jamboree Unit. Were we expecting it to be cold? Not that cold! For some it was the first time camping for quite a while and it was a bit of a shock waking to frost on the tents and bleary eyed young people crawling out with every layer of clothing they



had brought. But we had fun! Lots of games and laughter, climbing, shooting, cooking and making friends. It was a brilliant start to our adventure and seeing friendships forming and young people challenging themselves is so rewarding. Hopefully the next camp will be a bit warmer!
